

Pupil Premium Children 2015/16 Review and Provision Mapping Report Summary 2016

September 2016

The school receives Pupil Premium Funding to support the needs of children identified as Pupil Premium to close the gap of attainment between this group of children and their peers.

Pupil Premium children are identified as:

1. Pupils in receipt of Free School Meals (FSM) or previously in receipt of Free School Meals (EVER6);
2. Children of Service families;
3. Looked After Children (LAC) or pupils who have been previously identified as LAC (Post LAC).

Annually, the school receives additional funding targeted at the needs of this group of learners. Through the process of assessing, planning provision, action and review we aim to enhance the provision of teaching and learning for these children and therefore accelerate their progress.

Pupil Premium Children 2015/16 Review/ Outcomes

- The attainment of the Pupil Premium children overall at Key Stage 1 (7 children) was less than their peers, however attainment of the Pupil Premium children at Key Stage 2 (4 children) was better than their peers representing a closing the gap for this group over time.
- In Reading at Key Stage 2, progress made by Pupil Premium children is significantly higher than all pupils in school and nationally. Pupil Premium pupils made very good progress compared with Pupil Premium children nationally and their peers.
- The progress of middle attaining Pupil Premium Key Stage 2 children (4) in writing was significantly higher than their peers and national outcomes. Two of the Pupil Premium children's writing portfolios (50%) were assessed as close to Greater Depth during Writing moderation.
- The progress made by Pupil Premium children at Key Stage 2 in Mathematics exceeded the progress made by other pupils in school, however progress against national outcomes were below national.
- Pupil Premium Interviews support the view that the additional provision helped to build confidence and a positive attitude to learning.

Planned Provision for Disadvantaged Pupils 2016-17

Early Years – continue to spend the Pupil Premium funding on Learning Support Assistant time support for inclusion, induction/transition, pastoral care and support to support the learning needs for disadvantaged children within Reception and Nursery. The additional Learning Support Assistant time will also enable an increase in the staff levels to support indoor/outdoor provision and support the use of Tapestry to engage parents with their children’s learning at this important early stage of development (equates to 25 hours - £13,700).

In Key Stage 1 and 2, tuition – both 1:1 and in small groups – will be continued to be targeted at Pupil Premium pupils who are in danger of falling behind their peers or who are under-achieving against age related expectations. This includes teachers with direct responsibility for targeted sessions in Key Stage 1 and 2, including Gifted and Talented groups for Literacy and Mathematics. (This support now includes Looked After children.) Led by Mrs Pope (Y3-5 PP children) and Mrs Crozier (Y6 PP children) (1 ½ days teaching per week - £8,000)

Use of the MAST teacher to offer peer coach to staff members to support the development of Maths Mastery in Key Stage 1 and Problem Solving activities deepening children’s understanding of Maths. Led by Mrs Crozier (1/2 day per week plus teacher release time - £4,000 + £4,000 supply cost)

Half termly Pupil Progress Meetings between the classteachers, Key Stage leader and the Headteacher will help to track the progress of this group with rigor. (£1200)

During Wednesdays Specialist MFL/Music, classteachers will offer Key Stage 2 Pupil Premium children 1:1 Assertive Mentoring and follow-up small group work. (£1500)

Additional Learning Support (WAVE3) programmes including Fischer Family Trust Reading, Better Reading Partnership, Firstclass@number and Success@arithmetic will be used flexibly to meet the needs of learners. The Every Child a Reader trained staff member will also offer training to parents, prioritising Pupil Premium children’s parents, to support with reading in school. (£540)

Last year the school re-established the ECAR programme to support Pupil Premium children requiring accelerated progress in Reading in Years 1 and 2. This will continue again this year due to the growing need for accelerated progress for this group of learners to avoid an attainment gap at the end of Key Stage 1. Led by Mrs Penny-Meech. (£6,000)

The school will continue to subsidise extra-curricular activities to enrich the experience of Pupil Premium Pupils including Music and swimming tuition, day and residential trips and sports clubs. (£2,000)

All Pupil Premium children will also be offered inclusion in the Children's University with passports and graduation photographs provided at no cost. (Led by Mrs Hammett - £200)
